Ask your adults to describe the way they listened to music when they were your age. Touch the objects and explore the different ways to listen to music now and then.

















# AND LEADERS





### **Dress up**














# STAGE

### Go to the next room to the 'On Stage and Screen' section

### **Telephone**

Find an old telephone and listen to Mr Cohen. Would this telephone fit in a handbag? Can you press buttons to dial a number? Discuss how telephones today are different from those in the past.

### Stage struck

Do you have the X factor? Try out your X factor star potential on our stage and watch yourself perform on film. If you need ideas, use our props to dress up as a star, strike a pose like the colourful cut-outs, tell a few jokes, sing, or tell a story.

Go to the 'Acting Out' label. The actor Ron Moody plays Fagin. Find the photo of Fagin and his costume.



In the musical Oliver!, Fagin is an unpleasant character who teaches young boys to steal. He is also Jewish. Some people think that all Jewish people are similar in character to Fagin, and say unkind and untrue things about Jewish people.

Do you know the name of the book that the musical Oliver! is based on?

(Oliver Twist by Charles Dickens)

Can you write a better joke on a postcard and hand it in at the museum shop? We will try to include it on a joke sheet for visitors to use on this stage.






### Variety of talents - magic tricks

### **Dream palaces**

Find this photograph of the original ODEON cinema. In the 1930s and 1940s, going to the cinema was the most popular kind of entertainment. Architects (people who design buildings) created wonderful 'dream palaces'.

This cinema is built in a special style called Art Deco. Design your own 'dream palace' in an interesting style. It may be a cinema or another entertainment building. What shape will it be? What materials will you use?
